
he was able to bring his family. And they also attended our Memorial Service. Rich will surely be missed by all of us.

From the onset of their time in command, LTC Coombs and CSM Abbott have focused on establishing a unit culture consistent with the traditions and legacy of 2-2 IN; a battalion built on a culture of priorities: LEADER DEVELOPMENT, READINESS, AND TAKING CARE OF SOLDIERS AND FAMILIES.

345 Soldiers; the battalion proudly stood in formation as seven 2-2 IN veterans signed the plank holder's activation ledger with their active duty brothers, officially recognizing its formation. The 2-2 IN activation ceremony served as an opportunity to highlight the Battalion's proud legacy and performance in combat through the display of the Unit Campaign Streamers and the reading of the Regimental history. On behalf of the entire Ramrod Battalion, LTC Coombs and CSM Abbott extend a sincere thanks and appreciation to all the active and retired veterans of 2-2 IN for their support on the momentous day.

LTC Coombs and CSM Abbott have placed significant emphasis on leader development. Continuous development of tactically and technically sound leaders is a prevailing theme throughout the organization, from the lowest Private, to junior NCOs, and especially the young Officers. Almost immediately, the battalion began a comprehensive Pre- Ranger and Ranger School candidate assessment program aimed properly identifying and training Soldiers to complete the arduous school. With seven Soldiers already completing the 10th Mountain Division (LI) Pre-Ranger program and 10 more to attend next month, the battalion continues to move towards the goal of filling the ranks with confident, qualified Rangers.

As we look to the future, 2-2 IN continues on the path to being an elite light infantry battalion. In preparation for the upcoming Expert Infantry Badge competition, the Soldiers of the battalion are training and meeting pre- requisites to master individual infantry tasks. Over the past several weeks, these Soldiers have spent countless hours at the range building to expert qualification, honing in their tactical acumen through combat focused training lanes, and perfecting their proficiency with a map, compass, their wits and confidence in the conduct of day & night land navigation. The attention to detail, focus on the mastery of individual skills and equipment, and quality repetitions will build a solid foundation of proficiency as the Battalion looks forward to its upcoming collective field training density in 2nd quarter (January – March 2016). As of 27 October, the Battalion is Soldiers from J Co. 2-2 IN inventory new received equipment manned at 519 of 653 authorized Soldiers and Leaders, with HHC, A, B, and .



support company J stood up and manned, and C and D (weapons) Companies establishing capacity for their activations on 19 November 2015. The Battalion is equipped at 50% of its authorizations, with equipment continuing to flow in weekly. The current forecast is to be both manned and equipped to over 90% in time to begin squad and platoon field training in February.

Overall, the past several months have been busy for the newly formed battalion. As the ranks continue to fill with capable Soldiers and leaders, 2-2 IN will continue to reinforce the culture of excellence as the prevalent theme in the organization. It is only a matter of time before 2-2 IN cements itself as the premier Infantry battalion within the Brigade and throughout the Division.








SECOND INFANTRY REGIMENT TRIVIA . . . ROAD TRIP TO MICHIGAN

This past August, my wife Kathy and I took a trip to Michigan. We had not been to Mackinac Island and beyond in quite a while. I thought that as long as we are there why not visit each place in the state where the 2d Infantry Regiment had been located?

We traveled up the western side of the state, along the shore of Lake Michigan. Our first stop was for lunch in Saugatuck. We ate in a very old hotel restaurant situated right on the lake shore. From there, we traveled to Ludington where we spent the night. A car ferry links Ludington across Lake Michigan to the docks in Manitowoc, Wisconsin. The following day, we traveled on to Mackinaw City, passing through Traverse City, Charlevoix and Petoskey - all small to medium cities on the lake that have the look and feel of the New England coast.

The next morning, we took the ferry to Mackinac Island where we visited FORT MACKINAC. The fort is on a high bluff overlooking Lake Huron and the passage to



Lake Superior. There are quite a few of the original buildings there and we toured all of them. Various companies of the 2d

Infantry were periodically stationed at the fort from 1826 to 1846. Additionally, we walked up a winding road through the woods to visit the post cemetery where three 2d Infantrymen are buried.



After our stay in Mackinaw, we went further north to Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan. It is located right at the Canadian border. In June 1822, Colonel Hugh Brady was directed to



advance with six infantry companies, to Sault Ste. Marie and construct a stockade and barracks upon the land ceded by the Chippewa Indians by the Treaty of 1820. Colonel Brady with Headquarters and Companies A, B, D, I and K – a total of about 250 troops, left from Buffalo, New York for Sault Ste. Marie on the steamboat Superior. Upon arrival, he erected the buildings which have since been known as old FORT BRADY. The fort is no longer in existence because it was built on very low ground along the Saint Mary River and has since been washed away. The site is a park,



where a plaque describing the fort's history can be found. It also contains a portion of a reconstructed stockade wall. Companies of the regiment were stationed at the fort at various times from 1822 until 1845.

From old FORT BRADY we proceeded a short distance to the new FORT BRADY which is located on much higher ground. This fort was built in 1893, whereupon the old fort was



abandoned. The 3rd Battalion of the 2d Infantry Regiment was stationed at new FORT BRADY from August, 1922 until March, 1941. When war broke out in Europe in 1939, soldiers from the 3d Battalion were assigned to guard the Soo Locks on the Saint Mary River, which divides the US and Canada, and are the connection between Lake Superior and the rest of the Great Lakes. The soldiers guarded the locks 24 hours a day for 2 years until the battalion was transferred to FORT CUSTER, Michigan. In 1941, the 3d Battalion provided soldiers who formed the cadre of the 702nd Military Police, which took over guarding the locks. The fort is no longer a military post it is now the Lake Superior State University (LSSU), with many of the fort buildings being used by the



school. It is in one of the buildings on LSSU campus (*Dr. Lou and Mae Lukenda Alumni House*) that hanging over the fireplace is a panoramic photograph of the 3d Battalion of the 2d Infantry and also two photo's of company personnel of the 3d Battalion.

Following our visit to the two FORT BRADY sites, we headed south to visit 2d Infantry Regiment, World War II veteran, Joe Rahie who resides in Sterling Heights, a suburb of Detroit. We arrived in Sterling Heights just after lunch and stopped at the complex where Joe lives. He was very



surprised to see us because I did not tell him we were coming. I have known Joe for going on 10 years, however this was the first time we've met face-to-face. We had previously only communicated via email, telephone and snail mail.

Joe was the individual who got me involved in the regiment's history. He was the National Historian for the 5th Infantry Division, which the regiment was with in WW II. Over the



years he has provided me with a wealth of information and documents. Joe joined the Army in April 1941 and was assigned to Company M, 3rd Battalion, 2d Infantry Regiment. Company M was a heavy weapons company and Joe attained the rank of staff sergeant with 81mm mortars. He was wounded in September, 1944 and returned to his company

where he remained until returning to the US. He discharged in July, 1945 and worked as a supervisor for the USPS. Joe is a terrific guy, he is 95 years old and still going strong. I hope to share stories about Joe at another time.

After our all too brief visit with Joe, we visited FORT WAYNE, which is in Detroit along the Detroit River. The original 1848 limestone barracks with later brick additions still stands, as does the 1845 star fortification. On the fort grounds, outside the original star fort are additional barracks, officer quarters, a hospital, shops, a recreation building, the commissary, a guard house, a garage, and stables. Unfortunately, access to

the site was closed the day we arrive and we could only view it from outside the fence. Beginning in 1922, the 2d Battalion was stationed at the fort



then Headquarters in 1929. They remained there until January, 1941 when the entire regiment was moved to FORT CUSTER, Michigan.

After that stop, we began our trek homeward. Along the way, we did not stop at FORT CUSTER since we had visited there several years ago. We noted that it had been greatly reduced in size, and what is left is used by the Michigan National Guard. Additionally, a national cemetery is located there. The 2d Infantry was located at FORT CUSTER from Jan/Feb 1941 until it went to Iceland in February/March, 1942.

Besides the sites we visited companies of the 2d Infantry Regiment were also stationed at FORT WILKINS, 1845-1846, which is located east of Copper Harbor on the tip of the Keweenaw Peninsula. FORT GRATIOT, 1834-1845, located in Port Huron and DETROIT BARRACKS (Detroit), 1845-1846, FORT WILKINS is a historic state park, FORT GRATIOT is complete gone as is DETROIT BARRACKS.

All and all it was a great trip and a thrill to visit Joe Rahie. We traveled over 1000 miles and saw many locations other than

those mentioned here. As an aside, just after leaving Detroit we stopped at a rest area east of the city. While there we were treated to a super air show put on by the Blue Angels as part of the Wayne County Fair. What a finish to a great trip!

TECHNICIAN 5TH GRADE FLOYD C. FENNER, 5TH INFANTRY DIVISION 2D INFANTRY REGIMENT, 1ST BATTALION, COMPANY C PART 1 OF 2 ARTICLES BY JIM LESLIE, VICE PRESIDENT SECOND INFANTRY REGIMENT ASSOCIATION



BASIC TRAINING - FLOYD FENNER was drafted at age 25 into the United States Army on March 25, 1941. He was married to his wife Virginia and was employed at Chrysler as an automotive parts packer. He was sent to Fort Wayne in Detroit, Michigan and then sent to Basic Training with the 2nd Infantry Regiment at Fort Custer in Battle Creek, Michigan where he soon realized that he was to become an infantryman. Floyd said that while the barracks were new, they had to sleep directly on sawdust floors. Training was hard and Floyd, when asked if he liked his new army life, responded with "No, I do not like this type of lifestyle". His main training consisted of rifle and bayonet, hand grenade, and small squad tactictal field problems. Near the end of his training cycle the 2nd Infantry Regiment was sent on two large field maneuvers in Arkansas, Louisiana, and Kentucky. Floyd stated that he felt like he slept on every hard rock while on maneuvers. At this time, he was assigned to the 1st Battalion Company C. After the maneuvers were completed, the regiment was alerted for movement to overseas. On February 19, 1942 the regiment sailed for Reykjavik, Iceland and arrived on March 3, 1942.

ICELAND - Floyd stated that the rumor was the Germans would invade Iceland to establish a German naval base. The Germans had already sent a landing party to see if it was feasible. The 2nd Infantry Division's mission was to defend 40 miles of coastline (west sector) and 60 miles inland, covering the entire western half of the island. The 1st Battalion was garrisoned at Ulfarsfel subsector. Military life in Iceland was strange and interesting to Floyd. The town was heated with hot water by a local geyser. It was strange to see no smoke out of the houses. There was not a lot to do and Floyd never went into town. From February 1942 to August 1943, most of his duties were guard duty and unloading ships and boats. It was strange to him to be able to play ball until midnight due to the constant daylight. One of the most beautiful and outstanding sights for Floyd was seeing the Northern Lights. He said "it was just beautiful". He did learn how to ski on a 200 foot glacier. It was the first time he had ever used skis and found it very exciting. It also snowed every day on his 4 man tent and one man had to shovel the snow off all the time so the tent would not collapse. He was in Iceland for eighteen months and they were told the reason they were there in the northern part was to try to make the Germans think they were going to invade Germany on the northern front.

TRAINING IN IRELAND AND ENGLAND - 1st Battalion arrived in Gourok, Scotland on August 17, 1943 and then they went by

train to England. New equipment and crew-served weapons were issued. Furloughs were granted for the first time in 17 months. While he was in England, word came down that the 2nd Infantry was going to become mechanized. So Floyd stepped up to become a driver. Only 3 people showed up for the job and all 3 were picked to become drivers. He was assigned to a jeep and his new job was to drive high ranking officers around and deliver military orders and supplies.

The 5th Infantry Division realized that very soon they would be heading to France in a combat role. The generals of the division felt it was wise to instill more training so they would be combat ready. The training dealt in the following areas: small unit tactical exercises, raise the T/O strength by adding new men to the division, squad and platoon leadership schools, upgrading marksmanship, company and battalion tactics, knowledge of German soldiers and their weapons, and battalion attack against fortified positions with air and artillery.



During the period of August 1943 to June 1944, the 2nd Infantry Regiment was combat ready. The alert came at 2400 hours on June 29, 1944 for overseas movement. Leaves were cancelled and personnel were sealed in their barracks. On July 6, the regiment sailed from Belfast, Ireland harbor at midnight. On the 9th, the convoy arrived off the coast of Normandy, due east of St. Mere Eglise, France at 2205 hours. The 2nd Infantry Regiment landed on Utah Beach D-Day plus 30. The regiment headed inland to the Hedgerows and the sound of gun and artillery fire. Fame and glory awaited them.

Private Floyd Fenner's jeep takes on a new role with the addition of a 50 caliber machine gun. Floyd moved forward with Company C off the Normandy Beach 20 miles inland into northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes, and central Europe (Germany).

SECOND INFANTRY REGIMENT VETERAN TURNS 100 YEARS OLD

Floyd C. Fenner was born August 13, 1915 in Kimball, Michigan. On August 16, 2015, there was a gathering of over 50 people at his home to celebrate his 100th birthday. Family and friends gathered on this wonderful August day underneath a large tent to celebrate this milestone. He had a large cake with one birthday candle which he blew out as



everyone sang "Happy Birthday". In addition, there were three generations of family veterans at his party. The picture shows Floyd Fenner along with his son-in-law Ed Polouich, who served with the 131st Aviation Company in Phu Bai, Vietnam from April 15, 1965 to April 9, 1966, and also his grandson Ken Polouich who served with the 24th Infantry Division, 3rd Infantry Regiment in Desert Storm from July 25, 1989 to July 25, 1993.

It is the author's belief that Mr. Fenner is the oldest living 2nd Infantry Regiment veteran alive today. He served from March 1941 until the regiment came home in 1945. His DD-214 shows five battle stars on his European ribbon bar which is the most any 2nd Infantry Regiment veteran could have won in battle. He was also awarded the Purple Heart for combat wounds as well as the Combat Infantryman's Badge.
